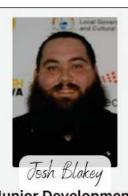

Volunteering in sport goes beyond simply giving time; it's about creating a warm and welcoming environment, purely for the bigger picture and not oneself.

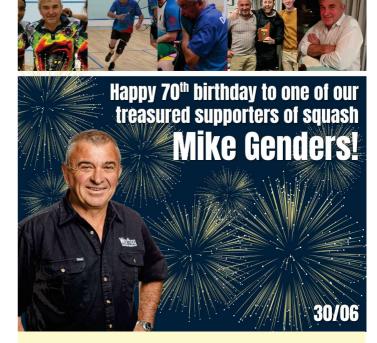

Geraldton Development Trip

A fleeting trip to Geraldton, some personal commitments meant not being able to stay for the Geraldton Open.

I travelled up on the Tuesday with the first session a coaching development session with the junior club coaches. I introduced a few of our new tools we are currently working with at our program in Cambridge, with a few of those flowing into the youth program as well.

A refocus on some of the simpler technique aspects of the grip and a balanced stance. We went through a couple of tweaks to the WSC tools and where some of them can be applied really well, such as a different way of remembering the grip and using radar / 2 hands to impact the ball. In order to hit with two straight arms, it challenges to players to get their feet into position and to impact it on the front foot.

Type of balls were a big topic and encouraged them to use the bouncier versions for a number of activities. Prolonging rallies was one, to improve court awareness. We introduced the 'manual ball machine' method, of dropping the balls onto a racquet on the ground for simple hitting to a target area. The ball would rebound higher off the strings of the racquet placed on the floor.

Another activity we introduced was getting them to play a rally by throwing the ball only. The early rallies were short but once they figured out their movement and their

strategy, the kids were having a heap of fun and getting a good work out! We started to see this translate into their proper rallies with racquets.

Due to the high school cancelling, we only had two school visits, Waggrakine PS and Bluff Point PS. Great to get back to both schools and introduce them to squash. Sounded like there was a bit of interest so hopefully the club picks up some new members.

A big thanks to the club for rounding up of some keen members to jump in for some private lessons. We saw some good improvement in movement, accuracy and strategy chats across the various sessions.

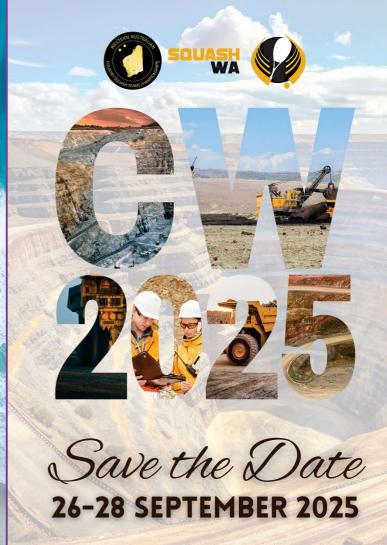

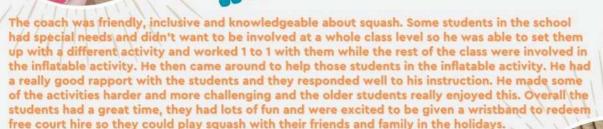

Coaches Corner

Coaches Need Practice Too

One of the biggest challenges on coaching courses, for some, is the art of feeding balls. For players who have played at high competitive levels, this may come easier than for the parents with a short history with the game but just keen to help out their kids.

My first real experience of this was a short stint in Japan, some shots needed a bit of work and the coach asked me to keep practicing my feeding. It was here that I discovered their front wall wasn't exactly flat, which explained why some feeds were going higher than others.

Regressing and progressing is an important part of coaching, not just for the player, but also for the coach. The key factor in any routine is making sure you can control things for your player to learn. Another consideration is that for some routines, it can be quicker to feed by hand rather than racquet.

Setups to Try

Arm yourself with a container of balls, and a racquet placed on the ground (racquetball racquets work best). Line yourself up, and drop the ball onto the racquet strings for the players to the hit the ball. This especially works well with all of those cold double dots that won't see much action for the winter period.

Bonus points for getting players to hit the shot then ghost to another corner, adding an extra cardio workout to the routine.

This setup can be done from anywhere on court and is great to focus on their position and impact. Grip, radar, action/result are all WSC (World Squash Coaching) tools that can be applied to this setup.

Hand Feed onto the Wall

Common one here is to stand close to the front wall for them to play a drop shot. Players can also drive for you to catch. If practicing a boast, you can stand close to the T, throw the ball against the side wall for players to move and boast; just remember to move out of the way in case they hit a great straight drive. You can progress this by throwing the ball into the back corner if you struggle to hit length into the back corners.

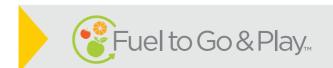
Racquet Feeding Tips

Your own footwork and stance will be important to control your shots especially early on.

Put some random targets on the floor or front wall to aim for. There will be times where you are trying to feed into certain spots; you need to be able to set the ball for your players in different areas.

<u>Understanding Tempo</u>

Feeding too fast may mean your player can't keep up, and too slow might not be challenging enough.

Understanding your Limits

Some routines may require you to be quite active (drive, drive, boast), so know your fitness level if you have multiple lessons scheduled for the day!

It's also important to remember that like many professions, coaching takes time to master a lot of elements, and even for those of us who have been coaching for 20+ years now, we are always learning new things. A carpenter spends a few years learning their craft, but many more perfecting it. Coaching is exactly the same.

For anyone serious about making a career out of coaching, in your early days you should snap up the opportunities - spend time with your junior club, attend workshops, observe advanced squads, work with brand new players, and over time, your ability as a coach will continue to improve.

Refereeing - Let's Play Fair

with Neil Butler

Racket Swing and Excessive Swing

I have touched on this subject before, but it is timely to have a reminder to refresh what is a 'Reasonable Swing' and an 'Excessive Swing'.

By definition, a 'Reasonable Swing' comprises a reasonable back swing, a strike at the ball, and a reasonable follow through. The backswing and follow through are reasonable as long as they do not extend more than is necessary.



Don't count the days, make the days count.

If the Racket swing is considered excessive by the referee, then;

- If the striker caused the interference by using an excessive swing, no let is allowed.
- If there was interference, but the striker exaggerated the swing in an attempt to earn a stroke, a let is allowed.

Usually, the non-striker cannot ask for a let unless:

• If the striker's excessive swing contributes to interference for the opponent when it becomes the latter's turn to play the ball; in which case the opponent may request a let.

I will let the coach tell you what constitutes an excessive swing.

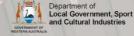

Grand Final Week

Without doubt the best squash article I have read in a long time!

State Grade Grand Final – Tuesday 13 May 2025

Mirrabooka (1 Tim Cowell, 2 Eric Gray, 3 Matt Sanders) vs Cambridge (1 Arthur Law, 2 Lewis Christie, 3 Pascale Louka)
